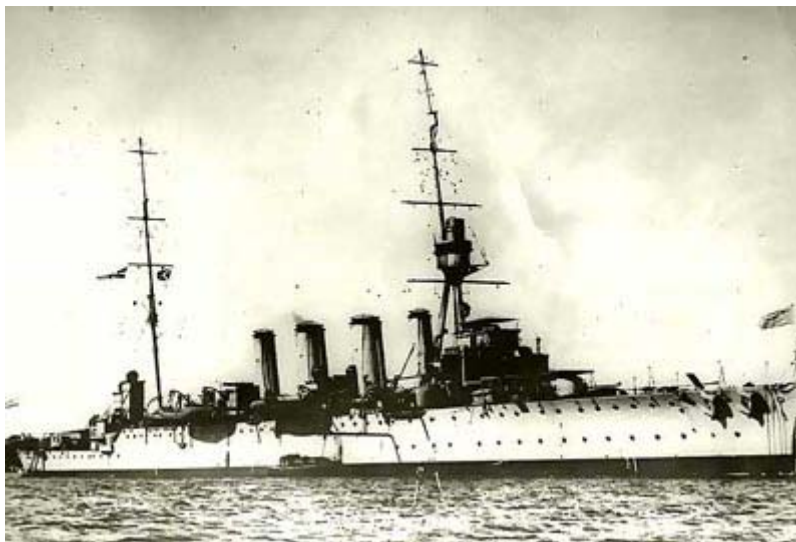

The Royal Australian Navy (RAN) initiated what will become a Naval tradition today by announcing that all Australian and foreign naval vessels proceeding into Sydney Harbour will render ceremonial honours to the HMAS Sydney I Memorial Mast that is located at Bradley's Head. The HMAS Sydney I Memorial Mast is considered to be one of Australia's premier naval monuments and a memorial of national significance. The Mast was removed from Sydney I when she was decommissioned in 1928 and erected at Bradley's Head in 1934. The ceremonial will represent a mark of respect and recognition of the Australian officers, sailors and ships lost at sea and in combat.

The announcement coincides with the 94th anniversary of the commissioning of HMAS Sydney I when she was bought into the service of the RAN at a ceremony at Portsmouth, England, on the 26th June 1913. This has been an initiative of the Commander Australian Fleet, Rear Admiral Dayvd Thomas, AM, CSC RAN who said, "It is appropriate that in a regular and formal way we recognise our heritage and demonstrate a mark of respect for the sacrifices of naval personnel that have played such a significant part in shaping this nation, particularly those that have laid down their lives. It helps remind us where we come from."



The actual ceremonial conducted by the ships will consist of bringing the ship's company on the upperdecks to attention, and then 'piping' the Mast. 'Piping' is the prolonged sounding of the Boatswain's call, a special Naval whistle, that was once the only method other than the human voice of passing orders to men on board ship. Today more sophisticated communications systems exist but the boatswain's Call is still used in ceremonial as a mark of respect and for emphasising important orders.

Following stakeholder consultations earlier today Defence has decided to defer any decision for the immediate future to cull kangaroos at the ACT Defence sites, Majura Training Area and the Belconnen Naval Transmission Station, in order to gain more information on suitable long-term kangaroo management strategies. At the Majura Training Area, Defence will seek an ecosystem-wide proposal to meet its Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 obligations with respect to threatened species of flora and fauna. Defence will monitor the size of the kangaroo population over the next six to twelve months and will explore all options as part of longer term strategy. At the Belconnen site, Defence will validate sustainable numbers and develop further management options.

I must admit I had a problem with email at first, ie Outlook won't run and you have to use windows live mail. Never been much of a fan of 'hotmail' and Outlook, so changed most email addresses over to 'gmail', which with its massive free storage space and the easy way of filing and storing messages, and haven't looked back.

I can't say, apart from a tiff with telstra over their non-operating dial up, that I've had any problems...I'm currently using my Compaq Pressario, whilst my 'Acer' is away having a new mother board put in. I was surprised out how the Compaq easily picked up our wireless network, and worked without having to install a driver.

My VOiP system worked first time, and so has everything else....

You do need a good CD/DVD burner program if you want to have re-writable disks, as far as I can see, but there are plenty of freebies.

I think that most problems will be quickly sorted out and that probably many already have. With many many millions invested, bugs have to be VERY quickly sorted.

(the problem with Telstra, is that they have an 8 weeks delay in training their staff in new systems...bit surprising, I thought, with a system like 'Vista...')

Security overall is better than XP, and I like Vista's clean interface, and is in the main, fairly intuitive.

My wife is computer illiterate (hope she doesn't read this) and has no trouble getting around 'Vista'. I've had the 'Ubuntu' O/S CD mailed out from overseas (free mail and free program) and whilst it looks good, there is too much work involved for me to want to use it over, say, windows.

It's a bit like doing crossword puzzles...the mental exercise in figuring it all out helps keep the grey matter operational...

And it all sure beats my old 'Tandy' tape-drive puter....

PS a very good disk defragger, that I use with both XP and Vista is 'Auslogic's Disk Defrag' which is a free download. Works FAR more quickly than the ones that come with XP and Vista. Google and you'll find it.

At the HMAS KUTTABUL memorial site, Garden Island, Fleet Base East in Sydney. Enter through the main gate at the intersection of Cowper Wharf Road and Wylde Street, Woolloomooloo. Photographic identification will be required.

The Minister for Veterans Affairs and Minister Assisting the Minister for Defence, Mr Bruce Billson MP, the Chief of Navy, Vice Admiral Russ Shalders, and the Commander Australian Fleet, Rear Admiral Nigel Coates, will attend the Ceremony along with the Japanese Ambassador to Australia, HE Mer Hideaki Ueda, and Japanese Defence Attaché, Captain Kazushige Nagai. The relatives of the Japanese submariners will also be attendance.

During the memorial service, there will be a parade by 150 members of the Japanese Maritime Self Defense Force (JMSDF) Training Squadron. A good murder mystery...

Do you like to read a good murder mystery? Not even Law & Order would attempt to capture this mess. This is an unbelievable twist of fate!!!!

At the 1994 annual awards dinner given for Forensic Science, AAFS President Dr Don Harper Mills astounded his audience with the legal complications of a bizarre death.

Here is the story: -----

On March 23, 1994... the medical examiner viewed the body of Ronald Opus, and concluded that he died from a shotgun wound to the head. Mr. Opus had jumped from the top of a ten-story building intending to commit suicide. He left a note to the effect indicating his despondency. As he fell past the 9th floor, his life was interrupted by a shotgun blast passing through a window, which killed him instantly.

Neither the shooter nor the deceased was aware that a safety net had been installed just below the 8th floor level to protect some building workers and that Ronald Opus would not have been able to complete his suicide the way he had planned.

"Ordinarily," Dr Mills continued, "Someone who sets out to commit suicide and ultimately succeeds, even though the mechanism might not be what he intended, is still defined as committing suicide." That Mr. Opus was shot on the way to certain death, but probably would not have been successful because of the safety net, caused the medical examiner to feel that he had a homicide on his hands. The room on the 9th floor, where the shotgun blast emanated, was occupied by an elderly man and his wife.

They were arguing vigorously, and he was threatening her with a shotgun!

The man was so upset that when he pulled the trigger, he completely missed his wife, and the pellets went through the window, striking Mr. Opus. When one intends to kill subject "A" but kills subject "B" in the attempt, one is guilty of the murder of subject "B." When confronted with the murder charge, the old man and his wife were both adamant, and both said that they thought the shotgun was not loaded. The old man said it was a long-standing habit to threaten his wife with the unloaded shotgun. He had no intention to murder her. Therefore the killing of Mr. Opus appeared to be an accident; that is, assuming the gun had been accidentally loaded.

The continuing investigation turned up a witness who saw the old couple's son loading the shotgun about six weeks prior to the fatal accident.

It transpired that the old lady had cut off her son's financial support and the son, knowing the propensity of his father to use the shotgun threateningly, loaded the gun with the expectation that his father would shoot his mother.

Since the loader of the gun was aware of this, he was guilty of the murder even though he didn't actually pull the trigger. The case now becomes one of murder on the part of the son for the death of Ronald Opus.

Now comes the exquisite twist...

Further investigation revealed that the son was, in fact, Ronald Opus.

He had become increasingly despondent over the failure of his attempt to engineer his mother's murder. This led him to jump off the ten-story building on March 23rd, only to be killed by a shotgun blast passing through the 9th story window. The son, Ronald Opus, had actually murdered himself. So the medical examiner closed the case as a suicide.

ENHANCED NOMINAL ROLL OF VIETNAM VETERANS LAUNCHED ON VIETNAM VETERANS' DAY

An enhanced online Nominal Roll of Vietnam Veterans with more information and improved search features is being launched tomorrow by the Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Bruce Billson.

The Roll replaces an interim roll that had been on the Internet for some time.

Mr Billson said it was appropriate to launch the enhanced Roll—www.vietnamroll.gov.au—this Saturday, Vietnam Veterans' Day.

"On Vietnam Veterans' Day we honour the more than 60,000 Australians deployed to Vietnam and the 520 who were lost to us forever," he said. "I urge all Australians to stop and remember the service and sacrifice of our Vietnam veterans."

Mr Billson said work on the enhanced Roll had been a significant undertaking by the Department of Veterans' Affairs. "My Department has manually checked around 61,000 service records and thousands of other service-related documents from different states, territories and government agencies to further develop the Roll," he said.

“The enhanced Roll can be searched by service number and name, by unit name, dates of service in Vietnam as well as date of birth, place of birth, and Honours and Awards received.

“Users can print a Certificate of Service for each veteran and view a photo of each of the 520 official commemorations of those who died in the Vietnam War.”

Mr Billson said it was possible that some details for about 1500 veterans may not be complete, although each of these veterans was on the Nominal Roll. “We have around 97 per cent of the details completed and the remainder will be progressively included,” Mr Billson said.

“Every effort has been made to ensure the data on the Roll is correct, but this has been a complex undertaking and if veterans find errors they should also contact the Department so they can be corrected.”

In publishing this Nominal Roll, the Department has honoured previous undertakings given to veterans who wished their entry to be suppressed or partially suppressed. Other veterans who do not wish to have their details displayed on the website can request, in writing, that some, or all, of those details not be included by contacting the Nominal Rolls Team via email at nominal.rolls@dva.gov.au or by calling 1300 780 133 (local call charge).

Mr Billson encouraged Australians to reflect on the contribution and sacrifice of Vietnam veterans during Vietnam Veterans' Day commemorations.

“This date was chosen to commemorate Vietnam Veterans' Day because it was the date of one of Australia's most costly victories of the Vietnam War, the Battle of Long Tan.

“On 18 August 1966, Australian soldiers from D Company 6th Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment, encountered the leading elements of an enemy force that was about 3000-strong in a rubber plantation north of the village of Long Tan,” Mr Billson said.

“Outnumbered by at least ten to one, but supported by the artillery of the 1st Australian Task Force, the Australians held firm with a remarkable display of courage and determination until a relief force arrived. During that fateful battle, 18 Australians lost their lives and 24 others were wounded, while around 245 North Vietnamese died, with as many as 500 wounded.

“Tomorrow, we remember all those who paid the ultimate price in that conflict and we thank the veterans who came home, having served their country.”

select handful of Royal Australian Air Force instructors will be chosen for lessons on how to land on US aircraft carriers flying the new F/A-18F Super Hornet fighter. The plan, which could eventually lead to participation in US carrier-based operations, marks the first time Australian pilots have flown off aircraft carriers since the retirement of the navy's flagship carrier HMAS Melbourne in 1982. The carrier training underscores the rapidly evolving military partnership between the US and Australian military. Senior US navy sources said the relationship was likely to involve an increasing convergence in training and tactics between the RAAF's fast jets and their US equivalent.

RAAF Flight Lieutenant John Haly will become the first Australian air force pilot to become carrier-qualified when he attempts his toughest flying skills test later this year. Asked to clarify RAAF Super Hornet training, Defence Minister Brendan Nelson said yesterday: "There is no plan for RAAF pilots to undertake training in aircraft carrier landings." The official government line contradicts briefings provided to The Australian by senior US military officials at Lemoore Naval Air Station in California that other RAAF "Top Gun" instructor pilots are expected to follow Flight Lieutenant Haly and be provided with carrier training. Full-scale Super Hornet training for RAAF air crew starts in the US in 2009.

"We've got him (Flight Lieutenant Haly) driving on the right side of the road so we figure he's trainable," said Lemoore-based Commander Art "Kato" Delacruz, executive officer of Strike Fighter Squadron VFA-122.

The RAAF is buying 24 F/A-18F Block-2 Super Hornets for \$6 billion to maintain its air combat capability between the phasing out of the ageing F-111 fleet in 2010 and the introduction of the delayed fifth-generation F-35 Joint Strike Fighter in 2013. Despite criticism of the deal in Australia, US Navy aviators say the the Block-2 Super Hornet is the world's most capable multi-role combat aircraft. Australia is acquiring a virtually identical aircraft to the one currently operated by the US Navy, with the first four aircraft scheduled for delivery in early 2010 and final delivery in late 2011.

Boeing, the manufacturer of the Super Hornet, says the Australian version will be equipped with enough technology for the aircraft to remain a formidable asset for the next 20 years. During a briefing at the weekend, Flight Lieutenant Haly said it took only five hours' flying time for an F/A-18C pilot trained on a "Classic Hornet" to become familiar with the new Super Hornet. Acquiring the tactical skills to take advantage of the jet's massive capabilities would take considerably longer, he said.

First Sea Lord Admiral Sir Jonathon Band said the decision to invest almost £4bn in HMS Queen Elizabeth and Prince of Wales – two 'super-carriers' three times the size of Britain's current flat-tops – ensured his Service would "continue to be one of the great navies of the world". The investment, announced by Defence Secretary Des Browne to Parliament, also guillotined uncertainty which surrounded not just the carrier project, but also the fate of Britain's naval bases – especially Portsmouth.

Admiral Band categorically stated that the carriers and their Type 45 destroyer escorts would be based in Portsmouth, whose future was guaranteed – as were the futures of Devonport and Faslane. Whitehall says it needs all three ports for the foreseeable future – although a review will continue to see how to make best use of the bases, their facilities and spare capacity. The First Sea Lord hailed the double announcement as "a very big day for defence and for the Royal Navy". He continued: "This is a powerful statement by a world player. We intend to have a powerful navy in the future – we are a player on the world scene." "There has been a lot of uncertainty. What is the future of the dockyards? Will we get these carriers?"

"This decision means that Portsmouth has a very exciting future as a base for the Royal Navy – and the Royal Navy has a great future, something Nelson would have liked." Whitehall has already spent £300m on designing the two carriers, which were first outlined as cornerstones of Britain's military policy in the Strategic Defence Review of 1998. Work on the ships will be spread around the UK with BAE Systems enjoying the lion's share of the work at Barrow and on the Clyde, with the remainder carried out in Portsmouth by the VT Group, by Babcock in Rosyth, and by Thales.

The new UK CVF Royal Navy aircraft carriers, HMS Queen Elizabeth and HMS Prince of Wales, are expected to enter service in 2012 and 2015.

"CVF carriers HMS Queen Elizabeth and HMS Prince of Wales, are expected to enter service in 2012 and 2015."

The design continues to evolve but CVF is expected to displace 55,000t to 65,000t, a size between the USA's 100,000t Nimitz class and the French 43,000t Charles de Gaulle class aircraft carriers, and three times larger than the 20,000t UK Invincible class carriers.

The carrier will have a maximum speed of 25kt. At 15kt the range is 10,000nm and the ship carries food, fuel and stores for an endurance of seven days between replenishments. Each ship will have a complement of typically 1,200, including 600 aircrew.

Further the CVF designation represents....

C= Carrier

V= Fixed wing aircraft

F= The British next generation carrier. ie. F stands for 'Future'.

The operational strategy for the carriers suggests that one carrier will be available at all times for high intensity, time-sensitive strike operations, a role known formally as Carrier Strike. The strike role will be undertaken by an air wing of up to 40 Joint Combat Aircraft (strike) – very likely to be United States' F-35 Lightning II Joint Strike Fighter (JSF) – plus rotary wing craft. The strike aircraft capability also can provide air defence and close air support for other British forces, both at sea and on land.

The second carrier will be roled as a platform for deploying helicopters and ground troops. In the case of helicopters, the new carriers are likely to be able to operate the UK's Apache, Merlin and Sea King helicopters, as well as future helicopter programmes and craft such as the US Marine Corps' VF-22 Osprey. Indeed, only recently the Royal Navy's carrier HMS Illustrious embarked USMC Harriers and Ospreys during an exercise off the East Coast of the US. The second carrier will share the helicopter role with the Royal Navy's other floating airfield, the Landing Platform Helicopter (LPH) carrier HMS Ocean. Having three 'flat-topped' platforms in the cycle will enable the UK to meet both the strike and helicopter roles, even if one platform is unavailable.

THE Defence Department wants to keep using spare parts and equipment containing deadly asbestos because it says it has been unable to find alternative products.

containing asbestos to give it time to replace existing parts.

But with that deadline due to expire, Defence has applied for another three years to keep using asbestos components, including everyday items such as brake pads, gaskets, seals, fire barriers, insulation and packaging.

The navy has listed more than 130,000 items of equipment parts that contain asbestos. The air force and army have listed hundreds of products containing asbestos that are still in use.

These include the P3 Orion aircraft, the Iroquois, Kiowa and Black Hawk helicopters, and a range of vehicles including Land Rovers, trailers and artillery pieces. Alternatives exist for several of the asbestos products used by Defence.

Exposure to asbestos over the past 80 years has resulted in thousands of cases of asbestos-related disease among Defence personnel, some resulting in premature death.

Executive director of the Asbestos Diseases Society of Victoria, Leigh Hubbard, said he was horrified Defence was seeking a further exemption.

"If this exemption goes ahead ... we are likely to see several dozen more victims added to the list. They should be like every other workplace in the country that's been forced to find non-asbestos substitutes and have a zero tolerance attitude."

In 2001 the National Occupational Health and Safety Commission declared a nationwide prohibition on the workplace use of asbestos products. It came into effect in January 2004.

Labor's defence spokesman Joel Fitzgibbon said: "This is just a typical example of a government which talks up its national security credentials and has been spending big on major acquisitions, but has underinvested in the things that go to the safety and welfare of our troops."

Defence Force Welfare Association national president David Jamison called on Defence to rapidly speed up the phasing out of asbestos components.

"You have to ask the question of where their priorities are because the health of our personnel is at stake," he said.

Despite being given more than 24 hours to answer basic questions on the use of asbestos products, the Director-General of Defence Public Affairs, Brigadier Andrew Nikolic, said he did not have time to deal with the issue.

"We don't give comments to the media after 3.30pm on Friday ... thank you for your interest," he said.

(I believe the Navy no longer has Ordinance Artificers, as such, as his job was re-categorized into several classifications with the advent of modern electronic weapons).

Many of us who served through the era when your father did are now well into their 70's with some over eighty, and I have found that the biggest majority of us who are still around the ridges are computer illiterate, hence the lack of response to your query.

Hope this helps.

VETERANS AND WAR WIDOWS SECURE PENSION INCREASE

Veterans will receive an increase in their pensions of up to \$18.60 per fortnight, the Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Bruce Billson, announced today.

Mr Billson said veterans' pensions, including service pension, war widow's pension and disability pensions, will increase from 20 September 2007.

"This pension rise is consistent with the Australian Government's commitment to protecting the living standards of veterans and their families, and supporting their welfare," Mr Billson said.

"From 20 September 2007, the Special (T&PI) rate of disability pension will increase by \$18.60 to \$938.00 per fortnight, while the Intermediate rate of disability pension will increase by \$11.40 to \$631.20.

"Extreme Disablement Adjustment will increase to \$495.40 per fortnight and the 100 per cent General Rate of disability pension will increase to \$322.80.

"The maximum rate of single service pension will rise by \$12.60 to \$537.70 per fortnight and the maximum rate for couples will increase by \$10.60 to \$449.10 each.

"The fortnightly pension paid to war widows will increase by \$12.60 to \$562.70, while the ceiling rate of the income support supplement, which is paid to more than 84,000 war widows, will rise to \$160.40."

Rates have also increased for benefits under the Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Act (MRCA). The MRCA widowed partner's death benefit is paid at the same rate as the war widow's pension, while MRCA Special Rate Disability pensioners receive the same payments as Special (T&PI) rate pensioners.

LABOR stands to gain the backing of the veterans' community after unveiling a \$55 million plan to increase pensions for former Diggers and war widows.

In a pre-election pitch to the 175,000 services community, Kevin Rudd will tomorrow promise to increase pensions by up to \$30 per fortnight for all disabled war veterans.

The promise, to be made by the Opposition Leader during a keynote speech to the RSL National Congress, follows a strong campaign by veterans to have pension increases pegged to a higher annual rate.

Labor's plan will affect nearly 140,000 disabled war veterans who have served in some of history's bloodiest conflicts, including World War II and the Vietnam War.

But it will also flow to veterans injured during more recent conflicts, including Iraq, Afghanistan and the UN-led peacekeeping efforts in East Timor.

"Veterans have sacrificed so much for our nation and they deserve more than having this Government tell them they have never been better off," Mr Rudd said.

"This announcement is a further step by Labor on the road to ensuring that our veterans and their widows receive the compensation that they so richly deserve."

The RSL and other veterans' groups have been lobbying the Government for years to index all disabled veterans and war widows pensions to the higher rate, known as MTAW.

Mr Rudd said the increased pension payment would see veterans earning up to \$30 extra per fortnight.

"Our veterans and their widows have paid a very high price for their service to our country. This is about fixing an injustice," he said.

Last night, the RSL national president Bill Crews said war veterans would be thrilled by the Labor announcement.

"Currently there is an inequity because these pensions have been falling behind the cost of living,"

He expected Labor to win plaudits from the RSL.

"We'll tell our members that Labor has signed up to it (the higher pension plan," he said.

"But we are not playing favourites here."

Labor's veterans affairs spokesman Alan Griffin said the commitment on pensions would take effect from September 2008.

"We have listened to our nation's veterans and their widows and we have responded to their concerns," Mr Griffin said.

He said veterans from recent conflicts were already needing assistance as a result of their injuries.

"The Howard Government has steadfastly refused to index the domestic component of the war widows' pension."
